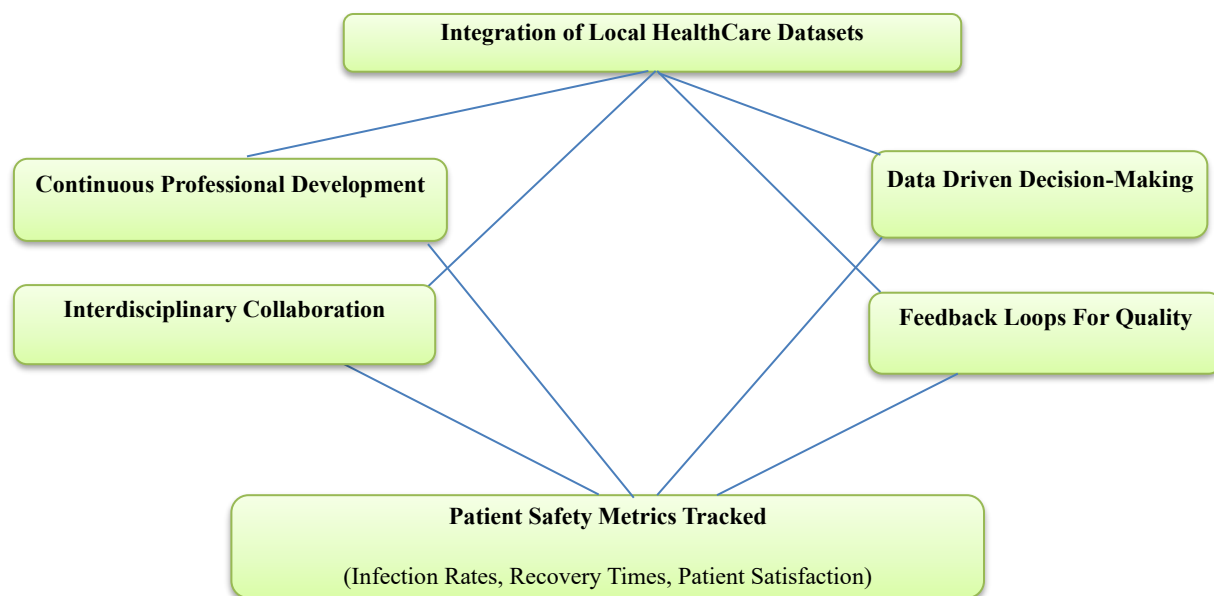


Figure 1: Proposed framework for evidence-based nursing integration in patient safety

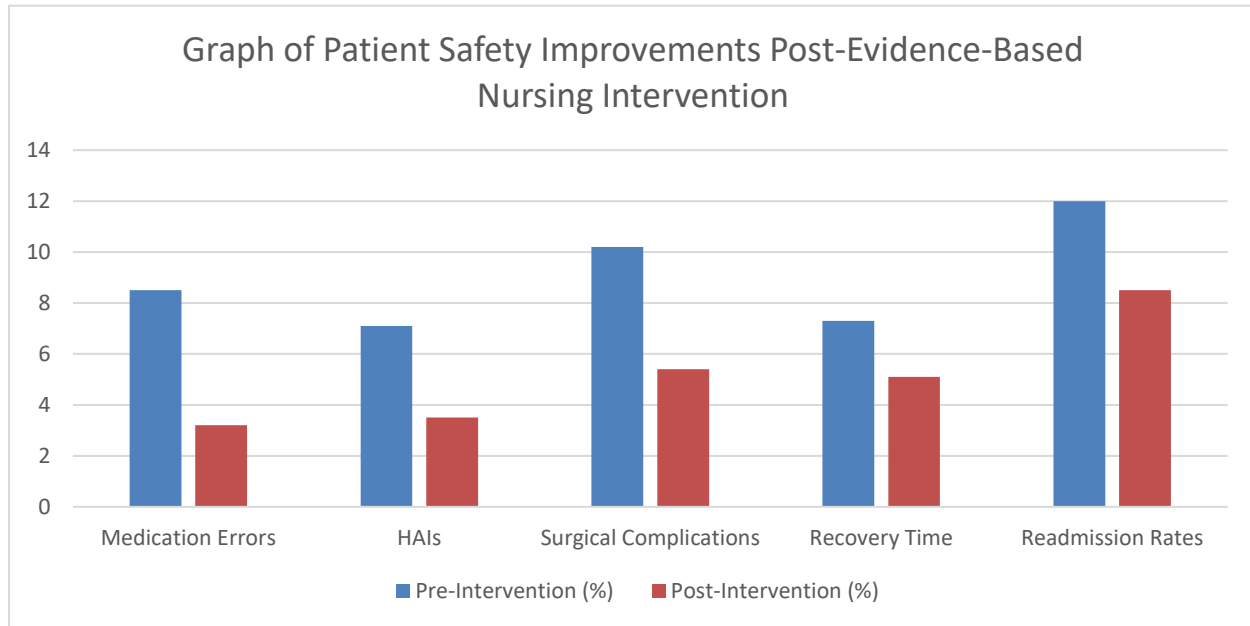


Figure 2: Evidence-based nursing intervention after improving patient safety
